Introduction

Ice Hockey UK (IHUK) is committed to promoting and supporting the principles and practice of clean sport across all our activities.

Passion, respect, integrity, determination and enjoyment as values are key to success in Ice Hockey, dovetailing with the UK Anti-Doping "100% Me" message. IHUK are committed to playing out part in ensuring that the ice hockey community provides an environment which supports fair play and clean sport.


IHUK works at all times in accordance with the UK Anti-Doping rules, which are the UK's interpretation and implementation of the World Anti-Doping Code. As part of compliance with the WADA Code, IHUK is committed to supporting and providing clean sport education to our athletes and support personnel at a variety of levels to ensure that all participants remain current with their clean sport obligations and can make informed decisions.

This strategy details how we will deliver this education and support for the 2021/22 and 2022/23 seasons.

Current Position

Sport Governance

The governance structure of IHUK is shown below. The IHUK board has overall responsibility for all aspects of the sport in the UK, as the recognised Member National Association of the International ice Hockey Federation (IIHF)




The **GB Programme Board** is directly overseen by IHUK and is responsible for all aspects of the national team programme at all ages (currently U16, U18, U20 and Senior Men and U16, U18 and Senior Women). This includes sending teams to compete in the relevant IIHF World Championship programmes, Winter Olympic and Youth Olympic Games.

The **Elite Ice Hockey League** is the top-level professional men's league in the UK, operated as a commercial entity. Players in this league are classed as "national level athletes" by UKAD and are subject to advance TUE requirements.

The **English Ice Hockey Association** is responsible for all "club" hockey in England and Wales, from junior level and recreational hockey through to semi-professional men's and women's leagues.

Scottish Ice Hockey has the same mandate for the management of the sport in Scotland and Northern Ireland.



Identification of Target Groups

Athletes



There are approximately 11 000 athletes registered under the IHUK umbrella; the distribution of these is shown above.

Around 200 athletes are part of the GB programme at any given time – there is significant overlap between squads at the age group levels and in the Women's programme.

There are currently 10 teams within the EIHL, with a maximum of 260 players in the league. There is again significant overlap with the GB programme, with around 40 GB athletes playing in the EIHL.

Athlete Support Personnel

As a team sport, our athletes are supported by a range of personnel, which may include:

Coaching staff
Team managers
Medical and para-medical staff
Strength/conditioning/fitness coaches

We recognise the influence that these personnel have on our athletes and the support that they can provide in helping our athletes make good choices.

Parents

We do not underestimate the influence and importance of parental support for our younger athletes, especially as their peak influence comes at a key stage in their sporting development which will impact on attitudes and behaviour throughout their careers.

Education Programme

Values Based Education

IHUK will adopt a "values based" approach to clean sport education, to assist our learners in developing appropriate ethical behaviours which will help inform their decision-making processes and approach to the choices they make.

Awareness

IHUK commits to increasing the awareness of Clean Sport issues within our sporting community. This will include participation in "Clean Sport Week" activities, and ad-hoc communications as appropriate, in conjunction with our media managers.

Information Programmes

IHUK will, as a minimum, circulate an annual update on the prohibited list and any changes directly to the following groups; any updates to the WAD Code will also be circulated to these groups:

- All National Team athletes and athlete support personnel
- All athletes required to obtain an advance TUE, and their identified support personnel

This information will be disseminated at club level to all other athlete groups.

Clean Sport Education

IHUK will ensure that all athletes and athlete support personnel identified as requiring Clean Sport education will complete an appropriate programme at least every two years.

We will encourage all athletes, irrespective of their current level of participation, to access appropriate education resources, and will provide signposting to these resources.

Where an athlete is returning to sport following a sanction, we will agree with UKAD and the athlete on the educational support that will be required, and how this nay be delivered.

Education Programme Audience

Our target audience for clean sport education in this cycle is as follows:

- All athletes playing in the Elite Ice Hockey League
- All registered coaches and team medical/paramedical staff in the Elite Ice Hockey League
- All athletes selected for the GB National Team programme (ultimately defined for monitoring purposes as those named on the "long list" for an IIHF competition)
- All coaching, medical and paramedical staff working with a GB National Team

These groups have been selected on the basis of risk assessment, coupled with an assessment of the resources available to deliver the education programme.

We recognise that athletes competing at lower levels, and those forming part of our youth programme, would also benefit from a Clean Sport Education programme, but we do not at this stage have the workforce resource to plan, deliver and monitor the delivery of such a programme at this time.

As further resources become available, we will re-evaluate the education programme audience, and look to include the following groups as resources permit:

- Athletes and ASP in the Women's National Ice Hockey League (WNIHL) Elite Division
- Athletes and ASP in the National Ice Hockey League (NIHL) National Division
- Athletes and ASP in the England/Scotland Junior National Team programme
- Athletes and ASP in the EIHA/SIH Junior Conference programme

Resources

IHUK currently have one UKAD-accredited educator, who also has a number of other roles in the organisation. We will need to expand the pool of educators available to us to deliver face-to-face education in the future, both by further recruitment and training and potentially by using educators from other ice sports governing bodies, with whom we are developing operational links.

The bulk of the initial learning for our athletes will at this time best be delivered in the form of online learning packages – this reflects the challenges we have in terms of both the diaspora of our national team athletes and the pressures on physical contact time.

We eagerly await the full implementation of the UKAD Learning Hub for all our learner groups. In the meantime, we have identified other suitable online learning packages appropriate for our various target audiences, including the WADA ADEL platform

Strategic Priorities

Our education priorities for the cycle ending 31st July 2023 are as follows:

- Identify, nominate, train and mobilise at least one additional Approved Educator via the UKAD training programme. If further suitable candidates are identified, make use of further quota slots to maximise the number of educators available to IHUK.
- Ensure that all athletes attending an IIHF World Championship tournament as part of the GB programme complete an appropriate online Clean Sport learning package, supported by a tournament-specific briefing
- Ensure that all coaching staff, and all medical/paramedical personnel working within the GB programme complete an agreed role-specific Clean Sport learning package
- Ensure that all athletes registered to a team in the Elite Ice Hockey League complete an appropriate online clean sport education package in their first season in the league; this learning to be repeated in alternate subsequent seasons
- Ensure that all Elite Ice Hockey League Clubs have a named identified Clean Sport Lead, who has completed an appropriate learning package, to act as a source of information and support to their athletes and support personnel, and a two-way channel of information with IHUK.
